

WHO WAS ST. GEORGE?

THROUGHOUT Europe in the later middle ages, the legend of St George was well-known. We are told that St George was a Christian knight and that he was born in Cappadocia. It chanced, however, that he was riding one day in the province of Lybia, and there he came upon a city called Sylene, near which was a marshy swamp. In this lived a dragon "which envenomed all the country". The people had mustered together to attack and kill it, but its breath was so terrible that all had fled. To prevent its coming nearer they supplied it every day with two sheep, but when the sheep grew scarce, a human victim had to be substituted. This victim was selected by lot, and the lot just then had fallen on the king's own daughter. No one was willing to take her place, and the maiden had gone forth dressed as a bride to meet her doom. Then, St George, coming upon the scene, attacked the dragon and transfixed it with his lance. Further, he borrowed the maiden's girdle, fastened it round the dragon's neck, and with this aid she led the monster captive into the city. "It followed her as if it had been a meek beast debonair." The people in mortal terror were about to take to flight, but St George told them to have no fear. If only they would believe in Jesus Christ and be baptized, he would slay the dragon. The king and all his subjects gladly assented. The dragon was killed and four ox-carts were needed to carry the carcass to a safe distance. "Then were there well XV thousand men baptized without women and children." The king offered St George great treasures, but he bade them be given to the poor instead. Before taking his leave the good knight left behind four behests: that the king should maintain churches, that he should honor priests, that he should himself diligently attend religious services, and that he should show compassion to the poor.

There are other legends as well, including some under that occurred under the emperors Diocletian and Maximian, part of a great persecution against all Christians. George, having given witness by publicly crying out "My God made the heavens and is very God.". Whereupon he was arrested, hung and beaten with clubs, and tortured with red-hot irons. He was poisoned, crushed between two spiked wheels, and boiled in a cauldron of molten lead, all without any result. Each time, the LORD restored him to health. Finally, Censorius Datianus ordered George to be decapitated, though Datianus himself, returning from the scene, was consumed by fire from Heaven.

There is no way to know the line between legend and fact, although the story of the dragon did not appear until the 12th century. While George's fame had travelled to the British Isles long before the Norman Conquest, it is not clear how St George came to be chosen as the patron saint of England, which was declared by King Edward II in 1347. He is remembered as a martyr, having given his life in witness to the gospel during the persecution of the church in the early 4th century. Very few details of his life have survived, his story being replete with legend. By the middle of the 5th century he was commemorated in local calendars and historical records of the period.

We know in fact that George was a soldier by vocation, serving as an officer in the Roman army. It is said that he "gave his goods to the poor, and openly confessed Christianity before the court."

George's initial notoriety may well have resulted from his faithfulness and witness to Christ during the Diocletian persecutions, 303-304, a particularly destructive period through which the Church suffered. Much of the legend of George dates back only to the 8th century, and more of it developed in the centuries that followed. The infamous story of George slaying the dragon, probably developed from Greek mythology, is not associated with him until the 12th century.

The inclusion of George's story in the 13th century manuscript, The Golden Legend, accounts for his growing popularity in the Middle Ages.

In the 12th century, George was recognized as the patron saint of soldiers and he was called upon in support of those who would fight in the Crusades. The shield under which his soldier's fought became a symbol of national pride for the English and in time was adapted into the national flag. Interestingly, the "St. George's Shield"—white shield emblazoned with a red cross—is the basis of the Episcopal Church flag and seal.

Almighty God, who didst commission thy holy martyr George to bear before the rulers of this world the banner of the cross: Strengthen us in our battles against the great serpent of sin and evil, that we too may attain the crown of eternal life; through Jesus Christ our Redeemer, who liveth and reigneth with thee and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever.
