After Opening Prayer, Fr. ALL SOULS' CHAPEL REFURBISHMENT



Recently a small refurbishment was undertaken in the All Souls' Chapel. The altar there was once the principal altar of Saint George's Church. It was most likely installed as part of alterations to the church in 1882. It remained in place following a further extensive interior redesign of the church in 1906. Subsequently it was replaced, and the altar was given to St. Stephen's Church, then a mission of St. George's

Church. Apparently, it was used for some years there and then given back once the construction of St. Stephen's Church was completed. When an expansion was done to the columbarium in the 1990s, this altar was placed in the All Souls' Chapel. Over the years the original mensa

(i.e. the top surface of the altar) had been lost and replaced by a plywood board. As this was somewhat lacking in dignity, Kevin Decker's father, Vernon-Frederic Decker crafted a new mensa made of cherry wood in memory of his parents Adan Allen and Bernice Butler Decker. Into this has been



Translation: "In the year 1924, on the 23rd of the month of December. I, Andrew John Brennan, Bishop Auxiliary of Scranton, consecrate this altar. Here are religues of martyrs S. Boniface and St. Victor inserted."

inserted an altar stone containing relics of martyrs St. Boniface and St. Victor and consecrated in 1924. St. Boniface was English and is known as the Apostle to the Germans, as England was Christianized prior to what is now Germany, he labored there, converting many until his martyrdom in 754 AD. St. Victor was according to pious belief a Roman soldier born to Christian parents who was martyred for his beliefs by the Roman army in 303 AD.

CHRISTMAS HIGHLIGHTS 2023

We all cringe a bit when stores put out Christmas ornaments and decorations in August. Most of our world can wait until the sugar-high of Halloween passes before we start addressing our holiday cards. But October was when Brian Taylor began introducing Christmas Eve music and the more complicated carols to the choir. Our St. George's Advent was generally sedate until the end, when we all took part in that necessary explosion of activity, the unruly annual Greening of the Church. At some point green anarchy subsided into chaos and then into a kind of rough harmony, ultimately resolving in the beautifully decorated St. George's that greeted us on Christmas Eve.

Kevin Decker's plan could not be put into place until everyone had a job, and there were many helpers. First, in the back room he organized Meg Falco, Natasha Bassant, Arianna Bassant, Chelsea Bassant, and Aiden Bassant making wreaths, which ultimately were hung on the doors and lecterns. Kyle Carlson, Eric Bassant, Paul Smigelski, Louisa Carr, Chris Henry, Rich Unger, and Jeff Wengrovius set up the trees on either side of the altar, with Chris Henry and Sue Hartz unsnarling and stringing the lights. Gloria Kishton with Bill and Bonnie Daggett took care placing the many poinsettias. Barb Wengrovius and Meg Hughes set candles and greenery in the windows. Constructing the crèche was a group project: Meg Hughes, Sue Hartz, Sandee Hughes, Ann Duff, Louisa Carr, David Kennison, and Jean Greenspan. Assembling the candelabras is a tricky, dangerous task, as there is always a chance one's masterpiece will tip over. Bill Daggett, Joyce Cockerham, Meredith Ewbank, David Kennison, and Rich Unger carefully placed and balanced each one. There was work outside as well: Jon Ewbank and Jon Pearson surrounded the west doors with garland. Grant and Colton Jaquith were instrumental in cleaning up the bits and pieces left behind by all the greenery and materials.

At midnight Mass on Christmas Eve, we welcomed the Christ Child's birth with joyful song and preaching. The St. Cecilia Choir preceded Mass with thirty minutes of carols and hymns, also singing *O Magnum Mysterium* by Tomas Luis Victoria and "Lo, how a rose e'er blooming" by Michael Praetorius during Mass. The service began with Baby Jesus being placed in his cradle in the crèche to the words: "Alleluia. The word was made flesh and dwelt among us: And we beheld his glory, Alleluia." Then the candles were lit. In his sermon Fr. Tom said, the church is called to always proclaim afresh the good news of Jesus Christ. The theme through the years of this beautiful Christmas story is the story of God's love for us, how he came into the world to redeem us from sin and death. God came to us so our story wouldn't be one of constant fear and sorrow. After Communion we, like Christians around the world, sang "Silent Night" in our hushed candle-lit sanctuary. Following the Last Gospel and Brian's glorious postlude, *In dulci jubilo* by JS Bach, everyone was invited to the Great Hall for a festive reception.

On Saturday, Jan. 6, Epiphany Mass was celebrated at 10:00, with the traditional blessing of chalk. Blessed chalk is still available in the back of the church with which to write the traditional New Year's blessing on our homes: 20 + C + M + B + 24.

The best gift for St. George's this Christmas was celebrating with our new Rector. Welcome, Fr. Tom!



EPISCOPAL EDUCATION

The Ordination & Consecration of Jeremiah David Williamson

It is difficult to capture the enormity of this day in a few words. The live stream video, as beautiful as it was, could not do it justice. You really had to be there - as were almost 800 of our fellow diocesan friends - to drink deeply of the grandeur of the cathedral, the majesty of the ceremony and the significance for the diocese



Episcopal Church. As this is service also includes an ordination rite, there was an Examination and agreement by fellow bishops. Who amongst us could forget the sight of Bishop-elect Jeremiah laying prostrate on the floor, face down before God and his fellow bishops as he prepared for his Consecration? Finally, the Bishop Presider proclaimed "Diocese of Albany, I present your new bishop," to overwhelming cheers and applause.

Bp. Williamson's wife, Jennifer, an ordained United Methodist Elder preached the sermon, relating that in their first visit to Albany, they were met with such overwhelming warmth and welcoming embrace, their uncertainty disappeared and they knew this was God's call. She said that "*Jeremiah comes to it with eyes wide open.*" Their 9-yr old son Isaiah read the first lesson in the service and their 12-yr old son

Oscar was an acolyte. Bp. Williamson's parents also had a role, presenting him with a crozier made by his father from wood from his grandparents' farm. [NB, this is not the historic crozier of Bp. Doane, the refurbishment of which was underwritten by St George's parishioners].

A Mass followed, as did a festive reception at the Fort Orange Club. Finally, our diocese had its 10th bishop!

In a letter sent later, Bp. Jeremiah wrote "God has called us to walk together, as blessed companions, guided into the vast future by the Holy Spirit. I've believed that for a while".. and ... "I am touched by your care. I am humbled by your embrace of me, my ministry, and my family. I am strengthened by your companionship. And I am consumed by hope for the future God has in store for our diocese." Your Bishop, +Jeremiah

- SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT -

I predict that 2024 will prove to be a momentous year for St. George's.

The past two years have proven to be hugely productive – we've spent time and money, toil and sweat in carefully addressing many needs in our parish, both in our buildings and systems and in the way in which we work. Boilers have been replaced, roofs have been repaired, wiring has been redesigned and brought up to code, grounds and gardens have been beautifully maintained and improved, the rectory was refurbished and much more. Our office procedures have been strengthened, new procurement procedures installed, finances have been audited. Truly, we are taking care of God's house!

Even without a rector, we have maintained our majestic high church liturgy with Sunday Mass with the help of many diocesan clergy that answered our call for help. This choir continues to provide the musical leadership to our Sunday Mass and other liturgies, offering anthems, the minor proper chants and leading the hymns and service music. In addition this ensemble has offered a number of choral liturgies throughout the year. Each week this group comes together on Tuesday evening to rehearse for 90 minutes and then arrives an hour before Sunday Mass for warm-up and additional rehearsal. - JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT -

So far this new year, our physical plant focus has been consumed by the need to deal with leak issues both in the Sanctuary roof and that of St. George's House. The availability of contractors and materials in January and February prevented us from being able to begin other projects. It doesn't take a rocket scientist to figure out that repairing and painting the sanctuary ceiling would have to wait until the leaks in that roof were sealed. Likewise, repairing the St. George's House roof needed to be done before we could start work on the repairs needed to the walls and ceilings in the sexton's apartment.



Finally in late February, our roofing contractor was able to acquire and apply the new roof sealing system. Both roofs have now been sealed with "Enduris 352," a silicone and polyester fabric roof repair product that, according to the manufacturer, will last 20 years.

The water damaged wall in the Great Hall first floor bathroom has been has been removed and repaired. Sanding, finishing and painting should be complete before the Rector's Installation.

Our boiler work is about complete, as new steam traps and new thermostats are currently being installed.

That will leave only the window repairs to St. George's House, the repairing and painting of the sanctuary ceiling, and initial repairs to the Sexton apartment still to be done under this year's planned maintenance actions.
